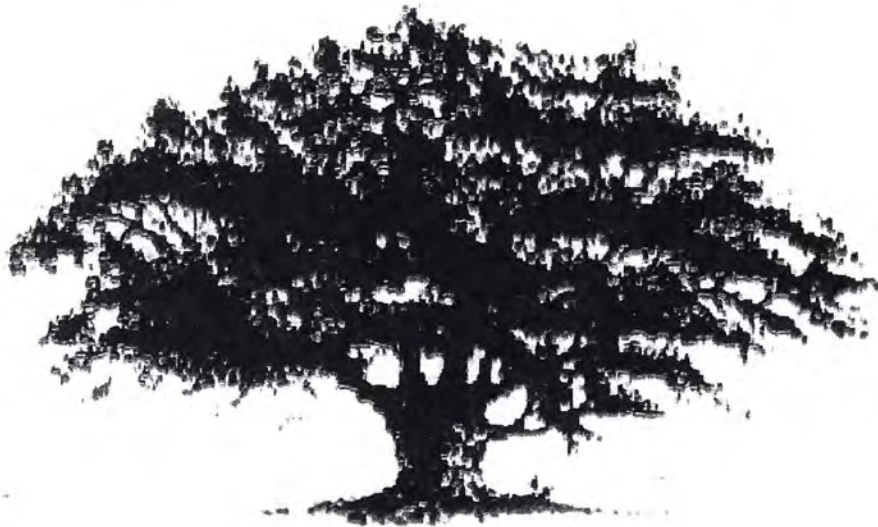

Names of Extinct Kansas Counties and Their Origin

Most of these counties were renamed and we have included the name of the "new" county.

Arapahoe – Named for the Plains tribe of Indiana. This county was disorganized and is now part of Colorado.

Billings – Named for N.H. Billings, a resident of Norton Center and a representative from the 100th district, legislature of 1873. The county name was changed to Billings in jest, and restored to **Norton** by the next session.

Breckinridge – Named for John Cabell Breckinridge, vice-president of the United States with President Buchanan. He was a presidential candidate in 1860. The area is now part of **Lyon** county.

Broderick – Named for David Colbreth Broderick, United States Senator for California in 1856. He was shot in a duel by Judge David S. Terry. The County disorganized and the area is now part of the State of Colorado.

Calhoun – Named for John Calhoun, who was the first surveyor general of Kansas. The county name was changed to **Jackson** after the Civil War.

Davis – Named for Jefferson Davis, president of the Southern Confederacy, the county was created in 1871. It eventually became part of **Riley** and **Geary** counties.

Dorn – Named for Andrew Dorn, who was the United States agent at the Neosho Indian Agency. The area is now **Neosho** county.

Fremont – Named for John C. Fremont, the western explorer and Union general, who was nominated for president in 1856. This area is now part of the State of Colorado.

Foote – Thought to be named for Andrew Hull Foote, United States naval officer. The area is now a portion of **Gray** county.

Garfield – Named for James Abram Garfield, 20th president of the United States. The area was annexed by **Finney** county in 1893.

Godfroy or Godfrey – Origin of name is unknown. The County name changed to **Seward** in 1861.

Howard – Named for Oliver Otis Howard, soldier and philanthropist. In 1875 the county of Howard was taken to form **Elk** and **Chautauqua** counties.

Hunter – Named for Robert M. Hunter, U.S. Senator from Virginia. He favored the admission of Kansas under the Lecompton constitution. The area is now attached to **Cowley** county.

Lykins – Named for David Lykins, a member of the Territorial Council of 1855. He was connected with the Baptist Mission among the Pottawatomies. The area is now **Miami** county.

Madison – Named for James Madison, fourth president of the United States. The area was divided between **Morris** and **Lyon** counties in 1860.

McGee – Named for Mabilion McGee, member of the Kansas Territorial house of representative in 1855. This area was attached to **Cherokee** county.

Peketon – Probably of Indian origin. **Marion** county was enlarged to annex this area in 1865.

Richardson – Named for Senator Wm. Richardson, a major-general of the militia of Kansas Territory. The name of this county was changed to **Wabaunsee** in 1859.

St. John – Named for John Pierce St. John, eighth governor of Kansas. The area is now known as **Logan** County.

Shirley – Named in jest for a young woman. In some records the area is referred to as Shelby. The area is now part of **Cloud** County.

Sequoyah – Named for Sequoyah, the son of George Gist and a Cherokee woman. He had devised an alphabet of 83 letters for the Cherokee language which was adopted by his nation. The area was divided with portions placed in **Gray** and **Finney** counties.

Weller – Believed to be named for Senator John B. Weller from California. The area was annexed by **Osage** county.

Wise – Named for Virginia Governor Henry Alexander Wise. His last official act as governor was presiding at the hanging of John Brown. The name was changed to **Morris** county in the late 1850's.
