A Couple of Easy Computer Hints

- 1. Improve readability Ever come across a webpage where the text is too small or the image can't be read? How do you improve the readability? Here's a slick little trick! Hold down the *Ctrl* key and the *plus (+)* key at the same time. The text or image will get larger. Want to make the text or the image smaller? Simply hold down the *Ctrl* key and the *minus (-)* key.
- 2. Have you ever stumbled across a really, really long webpage that is just full of names, dates, and places? Short of reading the entire thing, what are we to do? Try holding down the *Ctrl* key and the *F* key at the same time. A search box will appear in your browser. Type in the name or word in the search box and hit enter. The word or name will be highlighted for you and make searching quicker and easier. This trick will work in almost all browsers.

Historical Glimpse



Dr. Susan LaFlesche Picotte First Native American Female Doctor

Susan LaFlesche was born to an Omaha chief, Joseph LaFlesche (Iron Eyes) and his wife, Mary (One Woman) in 1865. Their home was on the Omaha reservation in Nebraska. Her early education was received on the reservation. Because father believed in the need for an education and urged his people to do so, she was afforded the opportunity to attend the Elizabeth Institute for Young Ladies in New Jersey. Susan returned from New Jersey at the age of 17 to teach at the Quaker School on the reservation.

When an ethnologist (one who analyzes and compares human cultures, Alice Fletcher, fell ill while working on the reservation, Susan tended to her health needs. With Fletcher's urging, she went back East to complete her education at the Hampton Institute. The resident physician there, Martha Waldron, encouraged her to go further and apply at the Woman's Medical College of Pennsylvania. Susan obtained a scholarship from the U.S. Office of Indian Affairs and the Connecticut Indian Association, a branch of the Women's National Indian Association. She graduated in two years from a three year program, at the top of her class in 1889. She returned to the Omaha reservation to provide health care for her native people. As the physician for the government school there, she faced widespread cholera, dysentery and influenza, along with many other medical issues.

Marrying in 1894 to Henry Picotte, they moved to Bancroft, NE, where Dr. Picotte started her own private practice. She treated Native and non-Natives alike. The marriage was cut short in 1905 with the death of her husband, a result of a terminal illness, and she was left to rear her two sons alone. The family moved back to the Omaha reservation, settling in the area of Walthill where she once again set up practice. In 1906 she led a delegation to Washington DC

to lobby for prohibition of alcohol on the reservation. She became the Thurston County Health Officer and a member of the Nebraska State Medical Association. She lobbied for better public health along with her fight against alcoholism. She traveled the lecture circuit in the United States and Europe to inform the public of the many problems the Native Americans faced. In 1913 she fulfilled a life long dream of establishing a hospital in Walthill. Susan LeFlesche Picotte died in 1915. Her hospital building is now a museum dedicated to her life's work and the history of the Omaha and Winnebago tribes.

She is credited with being the first Native American woman in the United States to receive a medical degree. She credited a childhood experience in which she watched a sick Indian woman die because the local white doctor would not care for her as an inspiration that led her to become a physician and to return to care for the Indian people and culture she was a major part of on the Omaha reservation.

Note: My grandmother, Mary Agnes (Morgan) Dick was born on the Winnebago Indian Reservation on 25 October 1908. Her grandfather, William Seth Morgan, was one of the white settlers who took advantage of a loophole allowing whites to settle on the Indian reservation. Grandma D. had many wonderful memories of going to school with her Indian neighbors and I'm sure that she may have encountered Dr. Picotte as Walthill was just a short distance from where Grandma D. lived. Before her death in 1995, I was lucky enough to make several trips with my Grandma to Winnebago to visit family. Grandma took pride in showing me where she grew up and recalling many of the Indian families from the country neighborhood. We visited the small town of Walthill.

Digital Afterlife

Have you ever logged into a social network site and were surprised to see a familiar face? Only problem with that familiar face......the person is dead! Yet, there they are smiling at us....... just like they did when they were living.

All of us who use the internet are bound to leave a digital footprint along the way. And, should something happen to us, our families would probably encounter problems in accessing or taking down information about us. This is a problem that we all need to think about. What happens to our data when we die?

It's best to deal with this before we die and leave our families a mess of digital assets without sharing the login data or passwords with our digital executor. Here are three things that we all need to remember:

- 1. Make an inventory of all your digital assets. This is a big job! Start with the important things. Your primary email account might be first on your list. This inventory may also include documents on your computer, data stored on flash drives or on backup discs, every online account that we have, as well as photos on our computers or phones. Some people keep their passwords and login information in encrypted files on computer storage sites. Personally, I still do it the old, fashioned way. I have a rolodex beside my computer which has a card with every website and password that I've created. I also keep the information in a small address book that I can toss in my purse or genealogy bag.
- 2. Decide what you want to happen to all your digital "stuff" after you're gone. Think of it......you've got emails, photos, videos and other materials that you've downloaded. You have online services that you've paid membership fees for. Who will be in charge of cancelling these services? You may even have some things that you don't want your loved ones to see. Make up your mind now and make your wishes known to those you care about!
- 3. Assign someone to be your digital executor. Be specific and explicit about what you want to happen to your assets! Don't assume that your family will automatically have access to or the right to use your digital "stuff." The laws vary greatly from state to state. There are codicils that we can make and add to our last wills and testaments.
